Wild sheep require special habitat features to meet their daily needs and to detect and escape from predators and other threats.

**Together, we can help keep their future bright:**

- Protect and enhance Bighorn Sheep habitat
- Keep dogs under control to prevent the harassment or killing of bighorns and other wildlife
- Avoid raising domestic sheep or goats in bighorn range
- Limit human disturbances, such as recreational activities, in areas Bighorn Sheep use



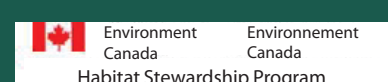

Wild sheep are very susceptible to diseases commonly carried by domestic sheep and goats. In the winter of 1999-2000, the south Okanagan herd suffered a 60-75% die-off due to bacterial pneumonia.
